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News from the BMCAI 2nd Quarterly Meeting 6th May 2023

The 2nd Quarterly meeting for 2023 was convened at Rice's Log Cabin Restaurant with 18 attendees. Invited guests included Mayor Brett Otto, South Burnett Regional Council, and Mayor Paul McVeigh, Western Downs Regional Council. Unfortunately, Ergon had to do some emergency repair work on a transformer on that same morning and the Bunya Mountains was without power for the meeting. Our venue hosts, Annette and Greg, kindly had some lights operating for us via a generator, but we were unable to deliver the powerpoint presentations that several people had prepared for us. We thank members and guests for their understanding, and Louis and Brett, especially, for their time taken preparing the presentations.

Highlights from the 2nd Quarterly meeting for 2023

Social and Events Subcommittee Report

Brett Mason, Subcommittee Chair, provided an overview of the *Bunya Mountains School Holiday Activity, Anzac Day*Commemoration Service and the *Bunya Walks Back in Time -In the Bush Where it Happened 2023* events.

Dinner Under the Stars 18 November 2023: The focus of this years' Dinner Under the Stars will be the food and produce bounty of the Region. This years' Dinner Under the Stars will be held in a new location on the green behind Rice's Log Cabins. The local band RYZA was very popular last year and has again been booked for 2023. Our Chef will be Roberta Schablon from The Saucy Fork, and, the South Burnett Wine Industries Association will provide the bar service.

180 seats will be available with tickets on sale from the 1st June via an online ticketing company. Ticket price this year will be \$120. Update on the bid for a Bunya Mountains Community Centre:

Louis Moore, Estate Analytica, is preparing the Feasibility Study but was unable to be present for the meeting, so Gerald Tooth provided an overview of the progress to date.

The community facility is the missing piece of infrastructure in the Bunyas, not just needed by locals, but needed regionally also. The Feasibility Study document is now in draft form and Louis is currently collating feedback to finalise the Study. Letters of support are still coming in and we are waiting on some. The BMCAI Management Committee have had some very early discussions with the Bunya Peoples Aboriginal Corporation with a view to collaboration for the development of the "Mowbullan Cultural Precinct" with assistance from a UQ Design Team or Independent Architect Design, which is yet to be determined. A future "Precinct" could include the Bush University, the BPAC "Camp", and the new community facility.



The next steps for the Feasibility Study are to arrange for the development of a Building Design Impression, finalise key issues, finalise the Feasibility Study and present it to the Western Downs Regional Council in a bid to acquire/lease the land for the Community Centre. A long journey behind and ahead....

Community Plan review and renewal Update: The meeting was provided with a brief overview of the updated Draft BMCAI Community Plan 2023-2026 which had been reviewed and updated by the Management Committee. The Draft Plan has now been circulated to BMCAI Members for their feedback and input. Feedback is due by XXXXXXX

The Interagency Meeting re Bunya Mountains Dingoes was held in the Fire Shed on 3rd April 2023 with representation from the BMCAI, Bunya Peoples Aboriginal Corporation, National Parks and Wildlife Service, South Burnett Regional Council and Western Downs Regional Council. The outcomes of that meeting are as follows.

- The meeting agreed that what is needed, and the way forward, should be a public education campaign that:
 - o is positive in wording so as to encourage visitors to learn about dingoes; notes that the animals that they see in the Bunyas are dingoes; assists residents and visitors to feel safe and results in holiday makers still wanting to visit the Bunyas; promotes the heritage of the dingoes and their crucial role in the environment and ecosystem, and their importance as the apex predator to assist in keeping other feral pests (eg pigs, rabbits and cats) under control in the Bunyas; and ameliorates the hysteria that has evolved due to past experiences on K'gari Fraser Island.
- The meeting resolved to develop a Bunya Mountains Dingo Management Plan. The first Draft of that Plan is now with the interagency meeting participants for their feedback and input.

Roads/ Parks Maintenance Update: BMCAI continues to raise with both Councils, the issue of the poor condition of the access and local road network and poor park maintenance on the Bunya Mountains. It appears that the long wait time for road maintenance in most circumstances is due to the extensive work needing to be done to major roads following the flood damage to roads earlier in the year. The cattle grid on the Kumbia / Bunya Mountains Road has been removed, and on the Maidenwell/ Bunya Mountains Road, are being removed as this Newsletter is being developed. We have also been informed that the sealing of the Maidenwell / Bunya Mountains Road will begin in August/ September this year.... Ever hopeful!!!

Rabbit Infestation Update: The Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board has sent letters to all local property owners indicating that a survey of properties in the Bunya Mountains is about to commence. If rabbits are found on any property, it is the responsibility of landowners to remove or destroy the breeding site and DDMRB will provide advice about how best to do that.

Mountain Bike Track Project Update -provided by Brianna Barnett, WDRC on 5.5.23. "Council is currently working through the final stage of works before the trails are safely opened to the public. Currently, our contractor is undertaking some maintenance works to clear vegetation and repair pest animal damage along the trails. Over the next month or so we will be installing a small number of protective low level 'bridge' structures at specific locations along the trails. These bridges are part of our plan to effectively manage Phytophthora to avoid spread. This was

identified as an additional required measure following the establishment of the trails, and we are currently awaiting materials to complete the job.

In addition, signage will be installed at the trailheads in the next [week] or two. The public opening is earmarked for June - we will advise the community when these plans are finalised, and a date is set.

We appreciate the community is excited to explore this new facility for the region, and we thank you for your patience as we move towards completion.







Council has some promotional filming planned to occur on site this weekend as the project is close to be finalised. You may see some additional activity at Russell Park and Fishers Lookout."

A couple of local enthusiasts recently went for a ride to check out the tracks and advised that the track was "looking pretty good".







Cr Brett Otto, Mayor South Burnett Regional Council (SBRC) addressed the meeting. The key points made by Mayor Otto:

The issues raised at this meeting will be followed up. Mayor Otto is supportive of the Community Plan as he is endeavouring to have all small villages / townships in the South Burnett develop Community Plans so their aspirations for their village can feed into the Council Planning.

Tourism is growing and preparations for the 2032 Olympics are underway as Councils wish to see some benefit for local governments outside of the southeast corner. Wide Bay 2032 Planning Committee is working on this and examining a triangle of eco assets (Southern Great Barrier Reef, Bundaberg, Fraser Island, Hervey Bay and Bunya Mountains, South Burnett).

Mayor Otto also advised that there is a growing Mountain Bike Track community in the Region and the South Burnett Mountain Bike Club has secured another \$250,000 to expand their trails.

The SBRC is working with the Kumbia community to examine ways to tap into the tourism market, for example, a caravan park so that van owners can leave their vans there and travel up to the Bunyas to visit.

Cr Paul McVeigh, Mayor Western Downs Regional Council (WDRC) addressed the meeting. The key points made by Mayor McVeigh:

Western Downs Regional Council has been proactive in the Tourism area and has recently released their Economic and Tourism Strategy for the next 5 years. Councillors Kylie Bourne (Tourism portfolio) and Kay McGuire (Community portfolio) are both active in this space.

2032 Olympics- 48,000 journalists will be visiting, thus providing international exposure of any site they visit. An opportunity exists to drive tourism and promote the concept of "the place to be". Feeding all of the visitors offers the opportunity for Agri business to provide the best quality food from net zero emissions producers. WDRC wants to be at the "Forefront of a Changing World".

Community Centre- Mayor McVeigh applauded the change of language to "Mowbullan Cultural Precinct" and stated that this language will assist in garnering local, state and federal government support. He believes that the preferred location (Russell Park just below Fishers Lookout) is a great spot.

Roads- Mayor McVeigh advised that WDRC is struggling to repair all of the flood damaged roads in the Region. \$170m has been provided to repair extensive flood damage with 3 contractors engaged thus far to do some of this work. It needs to be completed by 30 June 2024, but it's looking doubtful that it can all be done in that timeframe. Discussions are occurring with Jake Ellwood, CEO, Qld Recovery and Peter Scales, Director General, Transport and Main Roads.



Bunya Mountains School Holiday Activity 5th April 2023:

The BMCAI Social, Events and Fundraising Subcommittee recognised that there are no arranged school holiday activities in the Bunya Mountains, at a time when many families are holidaying here. Many families camp in the National Park Campground adjacent to the Dandabah Day use area, where this activity was conducted.

Bunya Mountains has a significant indigenous history and an amazing diversity of plants and animals and both those aspects of the Bunyas provided opportunities to share information about the Bunyas and create learning experiences for children (and adults!) The Social and Events Subcommittee liaised with local members with expertise, Bunya Peoples Aboriginal Corporation and the National Parks and Wildlife Service and created an afternoon program which included a "Let's Discover" program, a free sausage sizzle and movie screening of the movie "Sing2" (along with free popcorn!). We greatly appreciated some funding assistance from the South Burnett Regional Council's Small Local Build – Small events grant program, Shannon Bauwens, sharing indigenous knowledge, Brad Cocks from National Parks talking about being in the National Park and what it like to be a Ranger and members, Kay Joyce and Meg Noack's work on developing and delivering the Program and the delightful tucker with popcorn, expertly prepared by Janelle Petersen, and sausage sizzle prepared by Bret & Graeme. Your efforts were greatly appreciated by the 84 people who participated in the event. A wonderful time was had by all a few photographs:

News from The Bunya Mountains Natural History Assoc

The Bunya Mountains Natural History Association (NHA) is a volunteer organisation that also manages and operates the Cedarvale Information Centre and Museum. Like all community-based volunteer organisations, NHA needs to raise funds to cover operating expenses, including insurance. NHA has created various ways of raising funds, such as, the sale of books relating to Bunya Mountains flora and fauna and local history. During the Bunya Nut season, NHA members collect Bunya Nuts (all from private property and not from the National Park) and shuck and freeze those nuts, and then make them available for sale when Cedarvale is open.

From time to time, the NHA members weigh the frozen nuts into 500 gram bags so they are sale ready. Recently, on one such occasion, some visiting children decided to assist NHA members, Bernice Seton and John and Sandy Learmont, by weighing and bagging the nuts. A most enjoyable time was had by all, as you see in the attached photographs.

Did you know? Some fun facts about Bunya Nuts:

[As told on "An evening with Richard Grant" on SBS 27 JAN 2022 -Article by Lucy Rennick]

"These giant bunya nuts are a key Indigenous food as well as snacks for dinosaurs. Yep, they've been on the earth that long... Weighing up to 10 kg, you want to watch out for falling nuts. These edible pine cones have been a key part of Indigenous culture for thousands of years.

For anyone familiar with bunya pine trees (Araucaria bidwillii), summer is associated with a distinct and interesting botanical phenomenon. Each January at the Australian Botanic Garden in Sydney's Mount Annan, the bunya pine trees begin to drop their cones.

If you don't think this is a big deal, you should know that they used to be dinosaur food millions of years ago - bunya pines have been on this earth for that long. The trees can grow up to 35-45 metres high and live for about 600 years. The pine cones that fall each year can weigh up to 10 kilograms, and contain bunya nuts, large edible seeds that have held both cultural and culinary significance for Aboriginal Australians for thousands of years.".........





Cedarvale is generally open on Market Days and Easter Sunday.

On the 26th February 2023, Bernice Hansen and daughter, Jeni, visited Cedarvale. Bernice came in to check on the Red Cedar Cabinet restored by her brother, Max Behm, and donated to Cedarvale by the family. The cabinet was originally used as a telephone cabinet in the Mowbullan Guesthouse by her grandparents, William and Anne-Marie Chandler. The Chandler's were Bernice's grandparents, and the first lessees and operators of the Mowbullan Guest House.

This visit by Bernice and Jeni set several things in motion. Bernice shared some stories, as provided by her Mum, about her childhood whilst living at the Guesthouse. As we were to learn on that day, Bernice's Aunt Moz, had recorded many stories of that time and Bernice still had the book of those stories.

This gave us the opportunity to learn lots more about the early days at the Guesthouse, and we approached Bernice and Jeni about coming to the Bunya Mountains to tell some of those stories at the upcoming **Bunya Mountains Walks Back in Time- In the Bush Where it Happened** event in May 2023. Bernice agreed but went one better and approached Auntie Moz's son and daughter-in-law to come along and tell the stories, which they did. It felt like we were back in the day as the stories were beautifully articulated and are a great tribute to the courageous pioneering

spirit of the women of the Chandler family.



Bernice has now presented a full copy of those stories to the NHA and Cedarvale. If you are visiting Cedarvale and would like to learn about the setting up the Mowbullan Guesthouse and the adventures of Anne-Marie Chandler and her daughters setting off to Brisbane to purchase the furniture and fittings, come on in to Cedarvale and have a read. Beautifully written and an entertaining story. Many thanks to the Chandler family descendants for sharing



their story and their ongoing interest in the Bunya Mountains. Another rich piece of the Bunya's European history now in Cedarvale.

More of the Marianne North Story:

If you were fortunate enough to have participated in the Munro's Camp activity for the Walks Back in Event in either 2022 or 2023, you would have heard about the English artist, Marianne North (1830-1890), and her Bunya Mountain's paintings completed during her travels in 1880–1881, as told by Mayor Peter Garrow (aka Gerald Tooth, BMCAI Vice President). Here John Learmont kindly shares another episode relating to the history of Marion North and the Bunya Mountains.....

Sandy and I received a phone call out of the blue in late July a couple of years ago from a bloke in Cairns who was coming to the Bunyas the following week looking for spots where Marianne North had painted scenes of the Bunyas in 1880.

Fortunately, I knew who he was talking about, having read her story in the folders in the reading room at 'Cedarvale' and having seen the Marianne North tree in Western Australia which was the subject of a previous article in the NHA newsletter.



His name was Dr John Dowe (pronounced like 'cow' he told us) and he was an adjunct research fellow from the Australian Tropical Herbarium, James Cook University, Cairns. He was also a Research Fellow at the Montgomery Botanical Centre in Florida, USA. He specialised in Palms and has named about 25 new species in various parts of the world. He was very interested in the Picabeen palms that are here, telling us that the Bunyas is the most westerly location in Queensland for them.

The reason he came here was that he had an interest in Marion North and also in photography. He wanted to locate the sites of her paintings on the Bunyas and photograph them in the present day.

He sent photos of the sites painted by Marion North that he wanted to identify, so Sandy and I went looking around the Bunyas before he arrived to try to find them. We were able to positively identify 3 of them.

What an interesting day it was and he was such a nice bloke. He had stayed in Dalby the night before and I met him at Munro's Camp at about 7am to show him one of the scenes that we thought that she had painted. The sun had not long risen and was in the wrong position for the photo and he decided to get it on his way back to Dalby in the afternoon.

Unfortunately, during the day the Murray Rangers burnt it, so it was just a blackened landscape. We tramped over the black and found a rock on which we believe Marion would have sat to do the painting.

After he left here he went to the Palms National Park near Cooyar that he described as 'a pleasant surprise...tens of thousands of palms, certainly one of the densest groupings of Picabeens that I have seen'.

He has subsequently published a paper about his trip in February 2020 in 'Cunninghamia' the journal of the Royal Botanical Gardens, Sydney.

Report from the Bunya Mountains Rural Fire Brigade

<u>Membership:</u> I was pleased to submit to Area Office this week, an application for membership for Lisa Wuersching. Lisa has bought 'Whispering Heights', the house opposite the Fire Shed and is living there with her 2 dogs. She wants to become a fire fighter. Her father was in the RFS at Bribie Island.

It is good to see Barry and Pat Stewart are both on the mend and well enough to go travelling again.

Thank you Brett and Graeme for looking after the batteries in Barry's absence.

At the end of March we farewelled Bob and Val Sommerfield who have retired to Toowoomba. Between them they had contributed almost 50 years to the Brigade. They came to the Bunyas in April 1998 and Bob held the positions of 1st officer, 2nd officer and 3rd officer. He was the officer in charge when we fought the fire at the restaurant. He was awarded the National Medal and the Diligence & Ethical Service Medal. Val looked after the administrative work and catering. She was awarded the Diligent and Ethical Service Medal.

The Marshalls arrived home from their trip and the Zigterman's left on theirs.

Peter Weekes has not been enjoying the best of health and we wish him a quick recovery.



<u>Training:</u> Peter Taylor has conducted another informative training morning where participants used the 'lay flat' hoses.



This has never been done before in my time in the Brigade. Their advantage is that they deliver a huge volume of water to a fire. Their disadvantage is that they empty the tanks very quickly. Training dates have been set till early next year. They are 15th July, 16th September, 11th November, and 27th January. Peter puts a lot of thought and effort into our training. Please



put these dates in your diaries and come along. You may learn something that could save a life. It could be yours.

<u>Toilets:</u> In late March Lynne Downes received a phone call from Craig Magick, Acting Superintendent, Regional Manager, North Coast Region advising that he would be looking after our request that QFES, on behalf of the Brigade, would arrange the acquisition and installation of an 'Operation Kenny' facility and negotiate with WDRC for its placement behind the Fire Shed. He made a commitment in an email dated 11 April to provide regular updates. We are still waiting to hear further about this. Meanwhile surveyors have confirmed the property boundary.

Fire Shed:

- (a) An audit was done by lan Clark from Area Office. There was nothing to follow up and that is a credit to the efficiency of our Shed Manager, Peter Weekes. He mentioned the pump exhaust on BM51 and asked if the operators used hearing protection when it is running. I showed him that in both trucks we have protective earmuffs with earplugs to attach to the new green radios so the operators can hear radio messages over the noise of the pumps.
- (b) At the February meeting it was decided to establish the capacity for electrical de-energising a building and a meeting has been sought with the Area Director about this.
- (c) With the purchase of second Stihl electric chainsaw, each truck now has one plus 2 batteries. Waterproof bags have been ordered for them.

Our Brigade has had a quiet autumn period and everything is in readiness for our next callout.

Scat finding report: by Anna & Robert Zigterman

This is a small postscript to the address about dingoes given to the Bunya Mountains Community Inc by Jenna Appley and Linda



Behrendorf from National Parks Dingo Management at the February 2023 meeting. The women stayed with us at Bidwillii the night after their talk. They were very pleased to meet our resident echidna on the way down to the laundry. We also went for a walk to Fishers Lookout on Sunday morning and I was impressed by their enthusiasm for every form of fauna we came across, big and small. One of our observations was on the new bike track where it crosses the driveway that goes up to Endless Views just opposite the Bidwillii driveway.

It was a large scat (turd if you're not in polite company). Linda became very excited about this and could describe it's position, large and proud in the centre of the track, as being indicative of a confident animal relaxed in its own territory. She encouraged us to collect the scat and post it off for analysis. This was a personal career first. We were given the address of someone who provided this service but there was confusion about getting the information back to us.

We have recently heard back and the news is this. The scat is from a canis species (ie it could be a dog or a dingo). The analysis was of scat formation and contents not DNA so the brief report could not give further information about it's source. The analyser did comment that there was no evidence of the animal eating any commercial dog food. The scat contained fur from a red-necked wallaby. So, it could have been a dingo and it certainly contained evidence of the local wallabies in its diet.

To reduce hydatid exposure risk it is requested that all scat samples be stored in paper bags to allow for heat treatment prior to analysis. For your own safety also remember to always use protection when handling scats. Samples can be sent via post or courier. For courier address please contact Georgeanna. For samples that have a particularly strong smell, please double bag the collection in plastic bags to limit odour.

Did you know about the Medal Mystery Solved by a local Metal Detectorist?

In late 2021, Peter Taylor unearthed a WW1 Medal at the base of the Bunya Mountains.

Upon cleaning it up, it was revealed that it was a Victory Medal and belonged to a person by the name of James Edwin Knight.



This commenced a long search for the descendants of James Edwin Knight so that the medal could be handed back to family members.

The Victory medal belonging to James Edwin Knight, was from "The Great War For Civilisation 1914-1919".

James Edwin Knight was born in Yangan just east of Warwick on 26 December 1895, living there until 1915 when he volunteered for service in France. Upon return from war and after many moves, James and his family accepted a transfer north to the small soldier settlement at Yarraman near Nanango, on 18th May 1923. The family returned to the Darling Downs in 1925, before moving sometime between 1928 and 1932 to Granville, now an eastern suburb of Maryborough.

It was in Maryborough, that Peter finally located James Knight's Grandson, Geoff Skerritt.

On 7th March 2023 Peter Taylor finally handed the James Knight's Victory Medal to Geoff Skerritt.

The Theme is: ESSENCE






