# **National Park Report**



# Allan Stirling Memorial Park Working Bee 13th October 2023-

The South Burnett Regional Council kindly delivered a truck and dog trailer of local mulch at 7am on that morning. There were plenty of keen workers and much was achieved on the day. We had 2 expert Dingo operators, Greg and Kieran, who moved all of that mulch into place. BMCAI members then raked it into place. There was also lots of tidying up the Bunya Avenue entrance to the Park, seedlings watered and picnic tables scrubbed clean.

# **Roads/ Parks Maintenance Update:**

**Munro's Camp Hygiene (Footwash) Station:** Western Downs Regional Council (WDRC) have advised that the budget for the purchase of the replacement hygiene station for Munro's Camp, has been approved. The Station has now been ordered and will be fitted upon arrival (expect a long lead time due to slow manufacturing of the stations).

#### Bunya Mountains Road speed reduction signage from Department of Transport and Main Roads (DMRT):

DTMR will be implementing a 40km zone on Bunya Mountains Road between Tolmie Street to the entrance for Rices Log Cabins. This new speed zone signage will be undertaken in the near future.

#### Western Downs Regional Council: Bunya Mountains /Dalby Road

A Snap, Send, Solve report was submitted in early 2023 regarding the constant flooding of the road. On 2.11. 23, a WDRC Council staff member advised that the pipes under the floodway have been cleared but he feels more pipes are needed. The staff member advised that the camber on the road is wrong and a potential cause for the damming of the storm/ flood water. Council has logged the defects with the Department of Transport and Main Roads.

# Extremely poor visibility on this road at night, in rainy, thick fog or cloudy conditions.

Side markers and cats eyes are missing so at times you simply cannot see if you might run off the road. BMCAI will utilise our previous letters to WDRC and TMR (and RACQ) plus any updated information re this matter and again prepare a letter to inform these agencies of the risks to road users and seek remedial action.

# **BMCAI Annual General Meeting (AGM)** will be held **2pm Saturday 3rd February 2024**. This will be followed by the first Quarterly Meeting for 2024. The Venue will be advised closer to the date.

A business item for the upcoming AGM: is the additional Management Committee positions:

- a. Chair of the Social, Events and Fundraising Sub-Committee- Given the pivotal role of this position in the work of BMCAI, the Management Committee extended an invitation to this position to temporarily join the Management Committee in early 2023. To make this position a permanent position on the Management Committee requires the agreement of 75% of Members in attendance at the AGM, so this will be put to the vote;
- b. Separate the Secretary position into 2 roles, that is, the Secretary and the Publications Officer, to assist in meeting the Associations needs in areas such as the Website, Facebook page, Newsletters, promotion of events etc. Again, this requires Member approval and will be put to the Vote at the AGM.

The meeting was followed by a Social Gathering and Sausage Sizzle. Many thanks to Annette and Greg Sprenger for the use of their facility for the meeting.

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# **Report from the Bunya Mountains Rural Fire Brigade**

#### Fire Brigade Report to 20th BMCAI Newsletter November 2023

We are currently facing the worst fire season since 2019 when the community was concerned about fire cutting off the access roads. The Brigade is as ready as it can be with 4 fully trained fire fighters and 7 trainee fire fighters living on the mountain and another 5 trainees a few hours away.

During the past 2 weeks there has been a total fire ban in the Burnett region.

You could receive a **PREPARE TO LEAVE alert** on your mobile phone. If you are in the area defined in the alert, then take appropriate action. It defines the danger area by the names of roads that border it. The alert is sent to all mobile phones in the danger area but sometimes the message can go to phones outside the danger area because the message system is not pinpoint accurate.

For some good news, I recently signed a new 30-year least on the Fire Shed and there is some positive news about the toilets. See the report below.

#### Membership:

Our members continue to battle the challenges of age. 3 members are recovering from serious illnesses and are back helping.

I have spoken to some potential new members. I have more membership application forms on hand.

#### Training:

We recently had training on the new P3 masks and carbon monoxide detectors that will soon receive. 11 fire fighters and 3 support members attended.

Lynne has organised First Aid training for the weekend of 10th and 11th of February.

#### Burning:

We attended fires at Bell and Alice Creek (27<sup>th</sup> October 2023). Peter Taylor, Brett Mason & John Paynter assisted.



#### Toilets:

The WDRC has agreed to issue a 'Trustee Permit' to allow a toilet block to be to be positioned behind the Fire Shed, subject to a number of conditions. ASCO has been requested to start the build. I thank the Rural Fire Brigade Association and particularly David Black for support in achieving this.

#### **Community Involvement:**

a. The Brigade attended the Community Resilience & Preparedness Day last Saturday, organised by the Bunya Mountains Local Disaster Management Sub-Group. We took a Fire Truck and erected the gazebo from Area Office. Six BMRFB firefighters handed out pamphlets and spoke to the public about the need to be ready for any emergency and to have a plan and evacuation kit ready.

b. Peter Taylor and I attended a meeting at BPAC hall about future Fire Management on and around the Bunyas. Landholders, BPAC people and QFES representatives also attended.

#### Fire Shed & Trucks:

a. The Fire Shed now has air conditioning in the bay where the kitchen is located. Shed Manager, Peter Weekes, is preparing to close off this bay from the other bay. Kingaroy Plumbing Works installed a gas stove and gas bottles



cage, so food can be cooked if there is an emergency and a power outage. Our generator can be plugged into the power board for a limited amount of power.

Breakfast prior to the September meeting successfully tested our ability to cater for a group.

b. Trucks and equipment are maintained ready to go with different members sharing the load.

# The deciduous trees are waking up

Have you noticed? The Bats-wing Coral Trees on the 3 roads up to the Bunyas, have flowers on them. This does not happen every year. The little leaves are now beginning to appear. This is how it happens on most deciduous trees. The pollinators get a better view of the flowers before the leaves appear.

The Lacebark trees are adorned with beautiful pink flowers. The Flame trees are a brilliant red colour. The Silky Oak trees are covered with flowers like the gold at the end of the rainbow.

The White Cedar trees had their delicate mauve flowers in early spring and now have a coat of new leaves.

The Giant Stingers are dropping leaves now and in December the flowers will appear.

This is a lovely time to be at the Bunyas.

# WEEKEND LAMINGTON NATURAL HISTORY ASSOCIATION (LNHA) MEMBERS' 26-27 AUGUST 2023

Bunya Mountains Natural History Association members were invited to the LNHA members' weekend themed - Fire in Wet Sclerophyll Forest. Sandy and John Learmont and Ruth and Graeme Wright attended this weekend.

We arrived on Friday 25th August and stayed at Suzanne and Steve Noakes home. On Saturday morning at The Pottery Shed, John Learmont introduced our group and we were warmly welcomed by Members of LNHA. Rod Fensham was the leader and guest speaker. Rod is an ecologist

who has published extensively on the flora and vegetation of Queensland. He is also a Professor at the University of Queensland and a Principal Botanist at the Queensland Herbarium. He spoke on Fire in Wet Sclerophyll Forest (see more detailed article below). Rod has published the ACE Guide to Eucalypts Brisbane which is designed to make it as easy as possible to identify species.

After Rod's talk on Saturday we had lunch and this was followed by a walk to look at and identify some of the local eucalypts. We had drinks and nibbles at Coomera Terrace, then moved back to the Pottery Shed for dinner followed by a LNP Themed Games Night. The next morning breakfast was provided, and John and Sandy did a wonderful job as BBQ chefs.

It was a great weekend thanks to the generous hospitality of the Noakes and the LNHA. We really appreciated Rod Fensham for his talk and later conversations which were informative while entertaining and led to many

interesting discussions. It was also inspiring to see what a great community there is at Binna Burra and the hard work (mostly volunteering) put in by locals to fight the 2019 fires and help to rebuild after the devastation. Resilience and teamwork at its best!!

#### Summary of talk on Fire and Rainforest/Eucalypt Dynamics by Professor Rod Fensham

Rod gave a stimulating talk on his recent research into fire and rainforest ecology which was initiated following the recent 2019 fires that decimated the Binna Burra Lodge at Lamington National Park (LNP). Over many years it has been an active field of research to explain how fire-sensitive rainforest and fire-tolerant eucalypt forest can co-exist in a fire-prone landscapes such as LNP and indeed our own Bunya Mountains. He described the existing forest types present at LNP which consist of the pure rainforest, the pure Eucalypt Forest, and the transitional zone where both rainforest and Eucalypt species co-exist (called Wet Sclerophyl Forest -WSF). Rod's research has shown that the rainforest is a lot more fire retardant than the WSF owing to the lower flammability of leaf material, lower fuel loads, very high turnover of the leaf litter, higher humidity, and lower wind speed

(especially during extreme fire events). The coexistence of Eucalypt canopies with rainforest mid-stories to form WSF is possible by recognising that rare fire events facilitated by higher fuel loads are essential to the formation and existence of the 'giant' Eucalypt emergents present in the WSF. Interestingly, Rod showed rainfall and daily Fire Hazard Index data which indicated that the Sept 2019 event at LNP was no more extreme than for other extreme fire events dating back some 120+ years. While some of the pure rainforest was burnt at LNP, he also believes that the severity of damage was exaggerated owing to inclusion of WSF as rainforest in older mapping surveys.

From my observations of the Binna Burra lodge area, it was evident that it was located in the middle of a large segment of WSF and hence was more prone to damage from extreme fire conditions. The pure rainforest area (where many of the walks are located at LNP) is adjacent to the Binna Burra lodge and was not affected by the 2019 fires.

Rod is a very interesting character and a fountain of knowledge on rainforest ecology and botany. We found out he has also done a lot of research at the Bunya Mountains back in the 1990's-early 2000's where he looked at reasons for the existence of the Balds adjacent to the BM rainforest. We have invited Rod to visit the BM sometime soon to share some of these experiences with the NHA and BMCAI groups.

#### **The Wallaman Falls**

- The Wallaman Falls are in the Girringun National Park, west of Ingham in north Queensland, at an altitude of 540 metres above sea level.
- They are the longest single drop waterfalls in Australia, falling 268 metres into a pool 20 metres deep.
- To give the photo some perspective, the little waterfall above the main falls is 70 metres high, and the Big Falls on the Bunyas are 90 metres high.

# Townships That Went to War by BMCAI Member, Christine Howard

- Each time I drive through the Maclagan township at the Bunya Mountains' foothills, I become more intrigued by its history. The township, with a population of approximately 340, has a town hall, corner store and church, and a pub in the neighbouring Quinalow. I stop at Maclagan's store on most trips up the mountain to grab a bite before making the last short leg of my journey. I love the store, and walking through the front doors, I feel transported back a few decades with memorabilia every way I look. There is a well-kept park within a short distance, and it always seems the perfect place to sit and eat what I have bought.
- The front of the park is a monolith with the words 'IN MEMORIAM of the Soldiers from this District who made the Supreme Sacrifice' inscribed on one side and 'This monument was erected by the residents of Maclagan & Quinalow District in honour of the soldiers who enlisted in the Great War 1914-1918'. On each of the four sides of the structure, lists of names are carved into the stone under the headings 1914-1918, 1939-1945, Korea and Vietnam.



- I took the time this trip to read and count 103 names. During the Second World War alone, 80 lives were lost in the district. Many surnames were engraved there twice, three times, or even four.
- *Think about that for a moment.* Think about a small country town and neighbouring district who sent their men to war, and 103 never returned. Fathers and sons, brothers and cousins. The men of the town. Young men, who not only believed they were doing the right thing but wanted to go, knowing they were doing something honourable and likely wanting to prove they were men and follow in the footsteps of those they respected. I may be naive, and the loss included women, though the monument only mentions the soldiers eluding to men in the day who went to war.
- Now, take a moment to think of that loss. The impact of those lives lost. The psychological grief that individuals and the community would have felt. The physical and financial impact of men who ran the properties and young men who did the manual labour. The social impact of a community without men has no way of procreating and building a future generation. The collective sadness, depression, guilt, anger and overall hurt of those left behind and the lucky few who returned. Though I imagine the few who returned felt nothing lucky about it. There is too much to bear, and I am surprised there is anything left of Maclagan eighty years on.
- I now have tears in my eyes and gratitude in my heart, and I do hope the next time you drive through the towns of Maclagan and Quinalow or any other similar township, you stop to read the names and think for a moment about the sacrifice that was made.

# Bunya Mountains Local Disaster Management Sub-Group:

The Sub-Group met on 12th October at the BPAC Hall, with representatives from Emergency Management Queensland, Queensland Ambulance Service, Queensland Fire and Emergency Services, State Emergency Services, Rural Fire Service, Queensland Police Service, Queensland Parks & Wildlife Services, Bunya Peoples Aboriginal Corporation, South Burnett Regional Council, and BMCAI. The Bush fires in Western Downs, so WDRC members were unable to attend.



#### Sub-Group Meeting Outcomes:

Efforts to have the Fire Shed available as a Critical Incident Control Centre, should a disaster occur here on the Bunyas, are continuing:

- Queensland Fire and Emergency Services (QFES) Area Office reassure us that the toilet is on its way
- The need for a reliable and effective power source should the Bunyas lose all power is still being pursued

   SBRC willing to apply for Queensland Reconstruction Authority funds but because the Fire Shed sits in WDRC area, then the application has to come from the Western Downs. The priority will be low given the massive damage that Western Downs have had with the current fires. Carol is working with Donna Brown (SBRC and Coordinator for this Sub-Group) to consider other options.
- QFES have installed wi-fi in the fire shed

#### Situation Reporting Training:

• This training followed the Meeting and enabled local members to gain skills in preparing reports to go up the Disaster Management chain so as to gain access to the resources and assistance that might be needed on the ground to support and keep people safe if a disaster strikes.

# Personal preparation- Bushfire Resiliency Rating:

- Recently featured on the ABC Program, "The Drum", a program featured a new app that lets you self assess your property's Bushfire Resiliency Rating in a bid to raise awareness and get people thinking about their own safety and how they can manage it better.
- The website address is <a href="https://resiliencerating.org/">https://resiliencerating.org/</a>. It takes about 20 minutes or so to answer questions about your house and surroundings and then it gives you a rating and suggestions on how to improve things.

# **Bunya Mountains Dinner Under the Stars 2023**

The BMCAI has a small Sub-Committee of just 6 dedicated and hardworking members who each year coordinate and facilitate this event. Those members are Brett Mason (Chair), Annette Sprenger, Meg Noack, Russell Sturgess, Carl Curtain and myself (Carol W). It is also important to mention that their long suffering spouses also help out prior to the event for the massive set up tasks and post the event for the equally massive pull down and clean-up of the site. So, a huge thank you to Greg Sprenger, Peter Weekes, Noel Noack and Rosie Rasmussen. We also want to take this opportunity to thank Sandy Learmont and the Sprenger family members and friends who helped set up, clean up and pack up afterwards. We wish to say a special thank you to Janelle Petersen, who worked with the wait staff for the evening, then donated her wages to the Association for the cause and came along and worked really hard on the Sunday cleaning up. (This is a beautiful example of community at its best!)

This is the third year of this event and the event has grown from 100 guests in 2021, to 150 guests in 2022 and 200 guests in 2023. The Sub-Committee seeks out great chefs with a focus on local food products and this year we were honoured to have a local, Chef Roberta Schablon, Locavore and amazing chef, a great band to provide the entertainment (RYZA are the best – we love you guys), the bar service provided by South Burnett Wine Industries Assoc Inc and exciting, sometimes unusual, but high quality, items for fund raiser auctions. Gavin (Spud) Jones and Scott (Hook) Henschen provide entertaining auctions as they bounce off each other to get the best price for the live auction items.

In 2021 and 2022, the Sub-Committee was reasonably sure that the weather would be fine in November and we proceeded to have our tables laid out "Under the Stars" (although anything can happen in the Bunyas!).

However, by mid year 2023, we could see that the weather patterns this year were very different and far more unpredictable than usual. Therefore, to ensure the comfort of our Dinner guests, we made the decision to hire a marquee. This was a very expensive exercise and whilst it didn't rain on the night, there was partial cloud cover (and the early threat of rain) and it did shield our guests from a cold wind that came up during the evening. Most guests indicated that they were very happy with that the marquee. A couple of days later and we are now experiencing lots of the most welcome rain in the region.

There is a huge expectation that this event will continue to occur each year. It is always a great evening and is the major BMCAI fundraiser for the year as we work towards creating a community space to meet, recreate, workshop etc. The cost of hiring equipment (everything from teaspoons to portaloos and the marquee), means that it is a very expensive exercise. With the amazing sponsorship we have had across the past 3 years, we could have almost purchased (with the exception of the marquee and portaloos) all the gear we need but because the Association does not have a building/ facility to store





goods and equipment etc, we need to continue seeking sponsorship each year to conduct this event.
